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The content of each article should not exceed 16 standard pages (1.848 symbols on every page, including spaces, 28,000 in total). In exceptional cases, at the suggestion of the editor-in-chief and with the approval of at least five editorial board members, specialists in the relevant field, larger or shorter articles may be published when they have fundamental contributions to the appropriate topic for the magazine issue. Articles must be submitted in South Slavic languages or English. If the editorial board agree, it is possible to publish articles in German, French and Italian.

Formal requirements:

Title: Times New Roman, size 14, Bold, Centered, Caps Lock.

Name and surname of the author: Times New Roman, size 12, Bold, Centered, above title.

Degree, official current position, e-mail address of the author, ORCID number: Footnote, Times New Roman, size 10, Regular, Justified.

Annotation in the language, in which the article is written, up to 1 standard page (1800 symbols), Times New Roman, size 12, Italic.

Keywords (in the respective language): after the annotation/summary, not more than 10, Times New Roman, size 12, Italic.

Text of the article: Times New Roman, size 12, Regular, Justified, Between the lines 1.5.

Page numbers: Times New Roman, size 10, Bottom of page, Plain Number 3.

Insert Footnotes: numeration from 1, Arabic numbers, Times New Roman, size 10, Regular, Justified. The following rules must be observed when quoting:

1) **Books:** Author's first name, surname of the author, Title of the book (italic), in brackets (place of publishing, colon, publisher, year), page number.

Example: Ljubomir Tadić, *Filozofija u svom vremenu* (Beograd: Filip Višnjić, 1998), 35.

When the text of one author is quoted for the first time, the full form is written, and in each subsequent case of quoting the same author, the abbreviated form is written.

Tadić, *Filozofija u svom vremenu*, 35.

If information is quoted from the same page from the same work as in the previous footnote, the Latin abbreviation for ibidem is used, with a period at the end (ibid.). The author's name and surname are omitted.

The text of two or three authors of one book is cited in such a way that the names and surnames of the authors are mentioned in the footnotes, separating them with a comma and a conjunction and when quoting the last author.

Example: Dragan Lakićević, Božo Stjepanović i Ilija Vujačić, *Teoretičari liberalizma* (Beograd: Službeni glasnik, 2007), 35.

In the short version, only the surnames of the authors are mentioned.

Short version:

Lakićević. Stojanović i Vujačić, *Teoretičari liberalizma*, 35.

When quoting in the literature, only the first author is cited first, followed by the first name separated by a comma, and then the other authors as explained.

A text with four or more authors is quoted by putting the first author's name and surname and adding the abbreviation et alia at the end.

Example:

Vladimir Vodinelić et alia, *Pravo medija s modelom Zakona o javnom informisanju* (Beograd: Beogradski centar za ljudska prava, 1998), 35.

In the short version, only the surname of the first author and the abbreviation et al. are stated.

Short version:

Vodinelić et al, *Pravo medija s modelom Zakona o javnom informisanju*, 35.

If the text from the book with several editions is quoted, along with the already explained rules and examples, the edition number is written after the title.

Example:

Jasminka Hasanbegović, *Perelmanova pravna logika kao nova retorika, drugo izdanje* (Beograd: Dosije, 2006), 35.

Short version:

Hasanbegović, *Perelmanova pravna logika kao nova retorika, drugo izdanje*, 35.

If the article from Conference proceedings is quoted, the name and surname of the editor are added after the word ed. or eds (if more than one editor).

Doyle, Kathleen, "The Queen Mary Psalter." In *The Book by Design: The Remarkable Story of the World's Greatest Invention*, eds. P. J. M. Marks and Stephen Parkin. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2023).

If the book is a translation, the translation information goes after the title.

Example:

Liu Xinwu, *The Wedding Party*, Translated by Jeremy Tiang, (Beijing: Amazon Crossing, 2021), 35

Short version:

Xinwu, The Wedding Party, 35

To quote a book consulted online, include either a URL or the name of the database in the reference list entry. For downloadable ebook formats, name the format; if no fixed page numbers are available, quote a section title or a chapter or other number in the text (or simply omit it). For citing a place rather than a publisher for books published before 1900.

If quoting the text of a scientific article from a Conference proceeding, write the following: author's name and surname, the title of the article in quotation marks, conjunction "in" the title of the proceedings in italics, name and surname of the editor with an abbreviation ed., (in brackets place of publication: publisher, year)

When quoting a text taken from a doctoral dissertation or master's thesis, write: name and surname of the author, title in quotation marks, doctoral dissertation in small brackets, name of university, year.

Short version:

Articles, reports etc. published as a part of symposiums/collections: author's first name and surname (in case of multiple authors, the rules for quoting books apply). Title of the article/report in quotation marks, taken from, name of the symposium/collection (in Italic), place, year.

Online sources:

Quotation of scientific articles that are available in online format as well as monographs that are available in electronic format is the same as for printed editions, except that location information is added in the form of the name of the database with the date of access to it or URL address.

Name and surname of the author, editor, title of monograph, dissertation or chapter to locate the cited text in as much detail as possible, the URL address or the name of the database and the date of access to that electronic source. If the article has its DOI mark (Digital Object Identifier), it should be written instead of the URL. The date of access to the article should be written after the URL or DOI tag.

Legislation

2. Legislation are listed with their full name in italics, followed by the official journal in which the regulation was published, number and year of publication. The article, paragraph and point of the regulation are denoted by the abbreviations art., p., and after the last number is not punctuated.

Listing of court decisions should contain as complete information as possible (type and number of the decision, date of adopted publication in which it was eventually published).

Dictionaries: Surname of the author, initials of the author's first name (in case of multiple authors, the rules for quoting books apply). Title of the dictionary, place of publishing, publisher, year, volume, page number.

Annotation/summary in South Slavic language: up to 1 standard page (1800 symbols), Times New Roman, size 12, Italic.

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
